GUEST CRITIC ARRIVES AT COLLEGE

This week, Arthur E. Bye, landscape architect and teacher, will be guest critic in the Department of Landscape Architecture.

Mr. Bye has been in private practice since 1951. His projects have been extremely varied and include a Campus Redevelopment Plan for Barnard College, a Site Development Plan for the Rutgers University Library, a master plan for the Cove Island Park in Stamford, Connecticut, and numerous plans for schools, apartments, and private residences. Some of the distinguished architects with whom Mr. Bye has worked include: Edward Larabee Barnes, Marcel Breuer, and Frank Lloyd Wright. He received the Award of Merit from the ASLA in 1958 and the Top National Award for Institutional Landscaping in 1959.

Our guest has traveled through Europe and South America, has lectured at the University of Pennsylvania and Pratt Institute, and has been visiting critic at Penn State. He has taught Theory of Landscape Architectural Design at Columbia University for eight years and Landscape Architectural Design at Cooper Union for nine years. He is still active at both of these colleges.

Mr. Bye will present a four-day problem and lectures to the seniors, the problem consisting of designing a garden and pavilion for use as a World's Fair exhibit for the Pepsi-Cola Bottling Co. All week (November 18-22) there will be an exhibit of his work in the Senior L. A. Lab, 303 Marshall Hall. All interested persons are invited to attend.
