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

THE FRESHMAN USED BOOKSTORE

Unfortunately the bookstore was rendered inoperative in the Spring semester due to the lack of volunteer student workers and the shortage of time in which to organize. However, the bookstore will function at the beginning of the Fall semester and all subsequent semesters. You will receive information regarding the store during the Summer. You will also have the opportunity to volunteer for Fall bookstore work during the Summer vacation period.

Briefly the approved bookstore plan is:

Forestry students will turn in their books and receive a credit slip which will be worth considerably more than University Bookstore purchase price. These books will then be sold at considerably lower prices than those of the University Bookstore. At the culmination of the sale, credit slips may be redeemed. If, however, your book was not sold, it will be returned to you. Thus no one loses. Profits from the sale will be put in the Freshman Treasury and used for social functions and various other activities.

Volunteer workers receive books at cost. This is, they pay the bookstore exactly what the bookstore paid for the purchase of the text.

Only books which will be used in that particular semester will be bought. Lists of books will be posted.

Please be patient and save your last semesters books. They are the ones which will be purchased in the Fall.

Bill King is now in his early forties. He has a family, but he's been in the hospital since 1962. His blood requirements are enormous -- fifteen or more pints of blood per week.

Will you donate in Bill King's name this Thursday?

If you do, the Red Cross will take your name. Mr. King will be notified that "X" number of forestry students were concerned enough to donate in his name. You can give him a psychological boost in his fight for life.
